

Removable Highlighting Tape and Tabs

Highlighting text has been a valuable study tool for many years. Unfortunately it is not always possible to highlight text in textbooks. It is never an acceptable alternative in library or reference books. Now with removable highlighting tape a student can highlight text where ever needed. The tape is transparent and comes in four different colors. You can also write on it.

- **Highlighter Tape**
- Yellow highlighting tape has been available for several years, but recently we have become aware of the tape from Lee Products Company It comes in four vivid colors, yellow, green, orange, and pink. It sticks securely, but removes easily. It is 916" wide by 393" and comes in a two roll pack that lists for \$4.00

- **Note Tape™**
- This is a transparent highlighting tape that comes in yellow only. It is 1 7/8" wide by 393" long. It is removable, transparent, invisible when photocopied or FAXed. It allows you to highlight a larger area quickly and to write on it. Cost \$5.00

- **Hefty Index Tabs7K**
- These tabs are durable. They won't wilt, tear or dog-ear. They are self-sticking, but removable and reusable. This makes them especially handy for marking places in reference books or library books that a student must find quickly. They come in five colors (orange, blue, green, yellow, white) or assorted. Cost \$4.00.

Implementation

Highlighting tape has a large number of uses. You might highlight new vocabulary, key words, dates, important people or facts, definitions, a sequence of steps or events or concepts pointed out by the teacher as being important It can be used by the student or by a service provider to assist a student. Different colors can be used on the same text for different things.

The note tape could be used to match sections of the text to questions at the end of the chapter. Because you can write on the tape, you could note in the margin which question is related to the section you highlighted.

A teacher of students with hearing impairments might use it to highlight different parts of speech for a student who is having difficulty identifying them.
